CITIZENS CONVENTION FOR A FEDERAL EUROPE

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The Wish

Europeans want a European Union that knows how to protect its citizens from problems caused by the shifting balance of power in the world. A Europe that is a true community and that does not allow itself

to be played off against each other by national or nationalist interests. A European Union that concentrates on caring for a handful of common interests, that guards and preserves the sovereignty and cultural identity of the Member States and that does not interfere in everything that the Member States are better placed to do themselves.

The Urgency

The reality is different. The European Union cannot control the advancing national sentiments that threaten the unity of the Union. Sentiments fed by an EU-lack of respect for the sovereignty of Member

States. It cannot withstand the pressure of the shifting balance of power in the world. Its prosperity is affected by the anarchy of trade wars. It has no control over autocrats - from within and outside the EU - who mock Europe's liberal democracy with divide and rule. Problems such as terrorism, refugees from wars and disasters, banking crises and global warming are waiting in vain for a common European approach


Why is that? The answer is simple: the European Union is wrongly constructed. She has the wrong engine. Its administrating system is officially called <u>intergovernmental governance</u>. This has worked well for a number of years since 1951, but with the arrival of more and more Member States and the increasing number of external problems leading to internal conflicts, it has now reached the end of its political life cycle. That is because his basis - the Treaty of Lisbon - is full of systemic errors. This foundation is too weak and requires constant repairs. But that will not work. System failures have two characteristics: they cause the system to implode or explode sooner or later. And any attempt at repair only makes it worse.

The Challenge

That Treaty, as the engine of the EU, is no longer capable of achieving unity and cooperation. We need a new operating system to guarantee the centuries-old need for a united Europe. The only form of state that

can fulfill the above wish is a <u>Federation</u>. And this must find its basis in a Constitution. Just as it happened at the end of the 18th century in America. It has thus become the most powerful country, holding together 50 sovereign states and serving as a model for other federations that already house 40% of the world's population. Instead of federalizing Europe, European political leaders waged wars for more than 200 years. Dozens of attempts at federalization failed. But one attempt has never been made: take as a best practice the success of the Philadelphia Convention (1787) - the birth certificate of the American Federation. That is the challenge. We are now going to do this in the Netherlands by organizing a Citizens' Convention for a Federal Europe. That Convention makes a Federal Constitution for Europe and submits its draft to the

people of Europe. Just as the Philadelphia Convention did in 1787. Then we will be freed from this image:



The Questions

Replacing a dysfunctional engine with a new one is not something you can do just like that. Unless you realize that he has been running since 1951 with the advent of the European Coal and Steel Community.

Would it not be time to provide the European Union with a form of governance that would respond to the huge problems it is facing? Of course, this challenge raises quite a few questions. To name a few:

- Will we then be stronger than the United States, Russia and China?
